

PRACTICAL INFORMATION

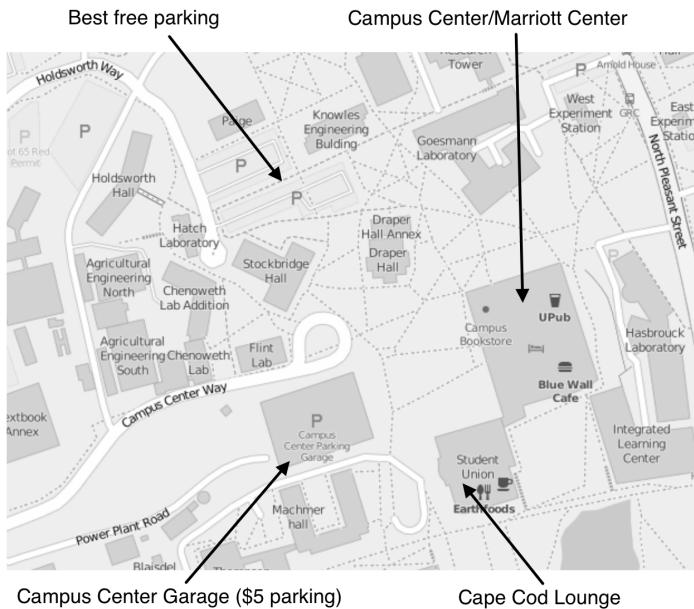

Meals are provided for those who registered for them. Your name tag will indicate whether you registered for lunch (L) and dinner (D).

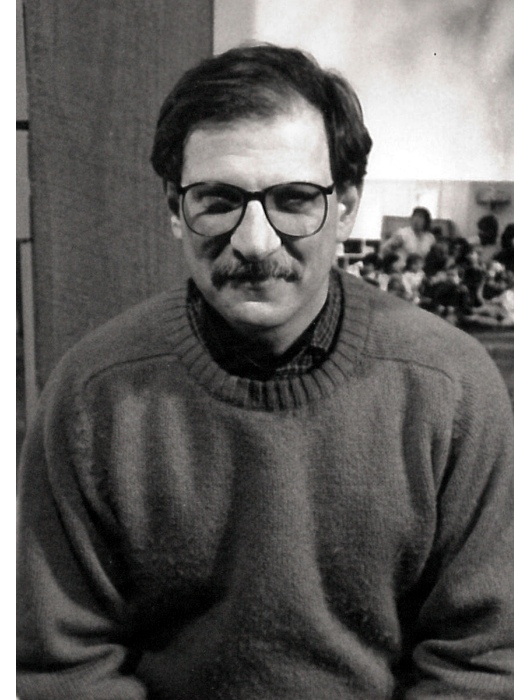
The **reception** will have a cash bar which will remain open during dinner. If you registered for the reception (there will be an R on your name tag), you will receive one drink ticket.
